Survey Methodology

The data come from survey questions the Annenberg Public Policy Center (APPC) placed on SSRS's nationally representative opinion panel of 1,077 U.S. adults conducted from January 3 through January 5, 2025. <u>SSRS</u> is an independent market research company. Only a randomly assigned half-sample of 538 respondents were asked these questions in the same manner as the previous surveys. The margin of sampling error (MOE) is ± 5.2 percentage points at the 95% confidence level for the n=538 sample. All figures are rounded to the nearest whole number and may not add to 100%. Combined subcategories may not add to totals in the topline and text due to rounding. The policy items APPC1A-E were compared to a multi-wave national probability panel conducted for the Annenberg Public Policy Center by NORC from April 18, 2019 through May 13, 2019 (Wave 5) among 2,344 U.S. adults. The margin of sampling error (MOE) is ±2.82 percentage points at the 95% confidence level. Item APPC2 from the January 2025 data was compared to the APPC panel surveys conducted August 9-15, 2023 (n=1,482, MoE ±3.5 pp), May 31-June 6, 2023 (n=1,586, MoE ±3.3 pp), and January 10-16, 2023, (n=1,641 MoE ±3.2 pp).

Political Party Identification

The item used to determine party identification was quite similar in all three datasets.

- APPC-SSRS survey (2025): Generally speaking, do you usually think of yourself as...a Democrat, a Republican, an Independent, or something else? (randomly ordered Democrat and Republican)
- APPC panel surveys (2023): Do you consider yourself...a Democrat, a Republican, an Independent, a supporter of some other party, or none of these? (randomly ordered Democrat and Republican)
- APPC-NORC survey (2019): Generally speaking do you think of yourself as...a Democrat, a Republican, an Independent, or something else? (randomly ordered Democrat, Republican, Independent)

The aggregated Independent/Other category includes all those who did not self-describe as Democrat or Republican, except those who refused the question or said don't know. The following tables present the same data by party identification. Given the reduced sample sizes when reporting by each level of party identification, only net support (strongly and somewhat support) and net oppose (strongly and somewhat oppose) are reported to increase the reliability of the estimates. Superscript letters indicate statistically significant differences within political party over time. Differences by party identification are not reported for item APPC2 because there were no differences within political party over time for that item.
